

Roadside planting

A low maintenance selection of hardy, native plants. The small feature tree is a titoki (evergreen), underplanted with a mix of low growing shrubs and groundcovers. A star jasmine is trained up the slat screen next to the gate for privacy. Species pictured to left clockwise from small tree:

- Alectryon excelsus* (titoki) small tree
- Arthropodium cirratum* (renga renga)
- Muehlenbeckia astonii* (evergreen shrub)
- Libertia grandiflora*
- Trachelospermum jasminoides* (climber: star jasmine)
- Coprosma 'Hawera'* (native ground cover)



Utility & Vegetable planters

Small, evergreen trees planted (in ground if no conflict with services, otherwise in raised planters) in a row adjacent to the garage. Fruit trees trained against fence behind raised vegetable planters. Lemon and lime (currently in pots) to be planted along this sunny fence in suggested positions. Photos from the image on the left clockwise:

- Fraxinus griffithii* (evergreen ash)
- Libertia grandiflora* (NZ iris)

Espaliered fruit trees
Treated pine raised vegetable planters, 1800 x 1200mm x minimum 400mm deep, with capping as illustrated, stained black to match fence.



Dense Boundary planting

Predominantly a selection of hardy native species, complemented by some hardy exotic species which will add year round interest and colour (mainly white, with hints of blue/ purple). Quick growing, small trees are carefully positioned along the boundary especially where privacy from neighbouring properties is required. The spectacular view through to the forested hills is preserved and emphasised by formal planting and the placement of paving, an urn/ pergola in this corner. To create the illusion of wider, denser planting the depth of planting bed is varied and lower growing shrubs and ground covers provide interest and contrast to the taller shrubs/ small trees.
